ART

CM RUSSELL

Famed cowboy artist, Charles Marion Russell, is cornerstone to the history and culture of Great Falls. Today, Great Falls is home to not just the museum that bears his name, but also to the home he shared with his wife Nancy, and his studio, all in one expanding complex. Since we haven't yet found someone to make hologram Charlie a reality, let us tell you a little bit about this fella.


In a time before everyone had a camera in their pocket, Charlie captured everyday life in the west. His work covers nearly all media: pencil, watercolor, pen and ink, oil, and sculptures. It also covers every subject: first people, women, wildlife, landscapes, historic events, cattle rustling, and gun fights.

Charlie created over 4,000 pieces of art in his lifetime, 2,000 of which are part of the C.M. Russell Museum's collection today. It was common in the late 1800's and early 1900's to find Charlie's work throughout the business community in Great Falls. Charlie would often adorn letters with sketches and

provide his work as gifts. It seems everyone in the area had a story about Charlie.

One story is about the Exalted Ruler that once hung in the local Elk's Lodge, where Russell was a member. The story goes that Charlie provided the lodge this painting in lieu of payment for a bar tab. It hung in the lodge for many years, getting covered by dust, cigarette smoke, and likely spilled drinks; a far cry from a museum quality environment. A community effort raised funds for the Museum to purchase this painting and restore it to its current glory. It adorns the walls of the legacy gallery now with a plaque that commemorates all those who helped fund the purchase.

FIRST PEOPLES BUFFALO JUMP

Native American History

Great Falls, Montana was a crossroad for a number of tribes prior to colonization. Many Indigenous people laid claim to the area, including Shoshone, Blackfeet, Crow, Nez Perce, Kootenai, Gros Ventre, and Assiniboine – but mostly, this was considered Blackfeet territory.

The reason it was so popular? The Missouri River. The river offered, if you will, a demarcation line. The Missouri River doesn't provide a lot of great places to cross; however, here, in what is now Great Falls, the waters are shallow, and the ease of crossing appealed to the tribes and the sought-after buffalo.

Great Falls may not strike you right away as a mecca of Native American history, but it's here to discover, nugget by nugget. It's spread across all the cultural

assets in Great Falls, but most notably, it's at First People's Buffalo Jump State Park and National Heritage Area.

Many people want to get to the edge of the jump and look out. Really, to get a full understanding of the buffalo jump, people need to know how they were used. The only way you can do that is to turn around and face backward. You will notice stones in a line, shaped like a V, with an apex that comes to the buffalo jump. Those stones created drive lines. Cattle were relatively easy to herd, but you don't herd buffalo. So, they had to be influenced in a specific direction. Then, at the critical moment when the buffalo are where they needed to be, they were stampeded over the edge of the cliff.

The buffalo jump was not the only method for Native Americans to get the

much-needed food and materials to survive on the plains, but it was the most effective numbers-wise. You could get a lot of buffalo in just one maneuver, but it took a lot of planning. The stampeding was just the first part of the buffalo jump experience. Whole camps were set up below where the women would come in and start the butchering process of the meat. Some of the meat was processed immediately and some was made into pemican to be stored and used through winter.

Symphony

Before you flip past this page, you need to know that Great Falls Symphony performances are AHH-MAZING, no matter your musical taste, and you don't need to dress fancy, if you don't want to.

Auditions are held each year for a seat on stage, and if you played band in High School, this may be your chance! The Great Falls Symphony has a mix of local and professional talent. Some of that talent is even Juilliard trained. The Symphony employs nine principal

musicians that also comprise the world touring Chinook Winds and Cascade Quartet.

Founded in 1959, the symphony has a long history in Great Falls. The symphony season runs through the fall and winter, and all performances are held inside the Mansfield Center for Performing Arts. During Episode 33 of the podcast, "We're No Dam Experts, Hilary Rose Shepherd, the Executive Director of the Great Falls Symphony, shares "We have worked tirelessly to make the



You will see famous musicians that join the symphony throughout the season, in 2019, Béla Fleck was here and Yo-Yo Ma in 2004 and 2016. Itzhak Perlman graced the Mansfield stage in 2005 and Midori in 2007, just to do a little name dropping.



Great Buffalo Hunt



Local Beer

Annually over 750,000 acres of malt barley are planted in Montana—a good bit of it within 50 miles of Great Falls. When harvested, it's hauled straight into Great Falls and malted. That malt is then delivered directly to the back doors of Jeremiah Johnson Brewing Co, Mighty Mo Brewing Co, and others. Then our breweries get busy creating the most local beer you can drink. There, we said it, Great Falls, Montana's beer is the localist beer in the world!



Jeremiah Johnson Brewing Company's production facility is in downtown Great Falls where 7 staple brews are produced and packaged in cans and kegs, including the flagship and multiple award-winning Scotch Ale named Mountain Man. Mountain Man + Jeremiah Johnson, get it? The brewery also produces special, one-off seasonal beers available on draft as well. Their award-winning brews can be found across Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Nevada, Washington, North Dakota, South Dakota and more, but your best bet to drink this local beer where it's made is to stop at MT Pints. Another fun note, Jeremiah Johnson Brewing Company is owned by a guy named Jeremiah Johnson and his wife Katherine, or as we call her, Mrs. Johnson.

BARLEY, MALTING, HONEY



Mighty Mo Brewing Company's production facility is also in downtown Great Falls AND is attached to their brew pub, so you can see the beer brewing while you drink it. The Mighty Mo, named after North America's Longest River running through Great Falls, the Missouri, has 6 beers produced year-round. Their selection increases with seasonal brews. Head brewer, Casey, gets dang creative with those seasonal brews, so try them when they are available – you'll be glad you did. General Manager Seth ensures you have a well-rounded experience by offering amazing pizza made with local flour. In addition to barley, our neighbors grow amazing wheat as well. The Mighty Mo experience is enhanced with a selection of natural wine, live music throughout the year, merchandise, and outdoor dining when it's the most reasonable season to sit outside and drink cold beer.

ON-THE-RIVER SAFETY TIPS



Bring a lifejacket



Bring 1 throw rope for every person on a boat



Bring 1 river knife for every person on a boat



Know the water level and temperatures - check waterdata.usgs.gov



Know the weather - bring appropriate clothing



Call local river outfitters to ask about potential hazards like downed wood or bear sightings



Scout rapids and blind river curves



Bring a GPS



Bring bear spray



Bring a change of clothes in a dry bag



Bring a first-aid kit



Ditch the cotton—opt for wool or a quick-drying material

BIRDING

If you're into birds, Great Falls is where you want to be. Here are two premium viewing opportunities.



Freezeout Lake Wildlife Management Area US Hwy 89, 4 miles North of Fairfield

Two lakes and six ponds create this 12,000 acre premiere wetland that serves as a rest stop for nearly 1 million waterfowl during peak migration. Nearly 200 species of birds frequent the area, including the rare gyrfalcon. See 300,000 snow geese and 10,000 tundra swans at one time in March and April.



Benton Lake Wildlife Refuge 922 Bootlegger Trail, Great Falls

This 12,383 acre refuge is home to a 6,000-acre glacier created marsh. 240 species of birds have been recorded in this Globally Important Bird Area. This Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network site is open year-round, but snow could limit access.

BIKING

From Mountain Biking, to Road and Trail Riding, Great Falls is your basecamp for biking. Here are a few trails we love. This guide is only for inspiration; make sure to grab trail maps from the Forest Service office, Bighorn Outdoor Specialists or Scheels.


Glaciers are present, but pay close attention as it isn't easy seeing an active glacier. The two easiest glaciers to see are Jackson Glacier which is visible from Going-to-the-Sun Road at the Jackson Glacier Overlook and Salamander Glacier, visible as you enter Glacier National Park from Many Glacier.

Open all year! Although, not always at every entrance to every mode of transportation. All other routes are in and out.



If entering the park from West Glacier, St. Mary or via the Camas Road, you will be required to have a park pass AND a reservation ticket or a service reservation to gain entry. All other entry points only require a park pass.



STATE PARKS

Sluice Boxes State Park

The first time I went down Belt Creek into Sluice Boxes State Park, I had basically just started kayaking. The day we went kayaking was a particularly cold day and it was overcast. It was in April or early May. I was dressed for the conditions in a drytop, which is a top that keeps the water off of you. It has little gaskets that go around your neck and your sleeves, but it was over a short wetsuit. I thought, that's okay, I'll be in the boat probably, most of the time. However, I was not. I fell out of my kayak several times while going down Belt Creek in the Sluice Boxes.

A lot of people, later in the season, put in at Logging Creek, and go down through Sluice Boxes. We put in at Monarch. It only took us about 4 hours because the water was up and running. But, when we hit the entrance rapid, there was a big rock with a Coleman

Canoe wrapped around it. So, we had to go around that and I wondered, oh my gosh, what am I getting myself into?

Once we got past the Riceville bridge, we started actually getting into the Sluice Boxes. I had passed all the rapids and big rocks, and it started to seem like it was pretty level. But, in all actuality there is a lot of undercut cliffs. When the water gets turbulent like that, it aerates so much that you almost start to lose buoyancy in certain spots. You will find there are weird little eddies in there that go back and forth. I had to stay very loose to make sure I didn't tip over.

The group of characters I went with was a small group of six people. All of them seasoned kayakers and the experience of falling into the water was all mine. When I got out of the water, my legs were as red as my hair used to be. It was quite the ordeal.

My advice is to not go during mountain runoff, like I did my first time kayaking Belt Creek which is a Class III. Consider starting your journey at Logging Creek. Be sure to wear a well-fitting lifejacket designed for kayaking and be prepared for the conditions. Prepare to encounter hazards such as downed trees and undercut cliffs. Consider wearing a drysuit if the air and water temperatures combined are under 100 degrees. Before you begin, make sure you are familiar with the water levels and check the CFS (cubic feet per second) on Belt Creek. Do your homework and map your adventure so you can truly enjoy the adventure of kayaking Belt Creek in Sluice Boxes State Park.

DAY HIKES

Great Falls is a basecamp to a variety of day hikes in a variety of area mountains ranges We've listed a few that might be just what you're looking for. This list is not designed to be your trail map, but rather just inspire your next adventure. Make sure to grab a trail map from the Forest Service office, Big Horn Outdoor Specialists or Scheels.



Windy Mountain Loop in the Highwood Mountains

Trailhead at Thain Creek Campground, just over an hour drive from Great Falls. Portion of route on gravel road. Approximate 9 mile loop



Memorial Falls in the Little Belt Mountains

Trailhead is off Hwy 89, just over an hour from Great Falls. Approximate 1.5 miles out and back



Big Baldy & Rhoda Lake in the Little Belt Mountains

Trailhead is off Hwy 89, near King's Hill Cabin on gravel road 3328, about 2 hours drive from Great Falls. Approximate 4 mile loop



Porphyry Peak in the Little Belt Mountains

Trailhead near Kings Hill Campground, just under and hour and half drive from Great Falls. Approximate 4 miles out and back
Trail is road that is open July & August



Jefferson Creek in the Little Belt Mountains

Trailhead is off Hwy 89, just past Memorial Falls, just over an hour drive from Great Falls. Approximate 8 miles out and back
Trail is a road.



Devil's Glen in the Rocky Mountain Front

Dearborn Trailhead is just under an hour and half drive from Great Falls. Approximate 6 miles out and back



Our Lake in the Rocky Mountain Front

South Fork Teton Trailhead is just under 2 hour drive from Great Falls. Portion of route on gravel road. Approximate 7 mile loop



Mount Wright in the Rocky Mountain Front

West Fork Teton Trailhead is just under 2 hours from Great Falls, through Choteau. Portion of route on gravel road. Approximate 8 mile loop



Cataract Falls in the Bob Marshall Wilderness Complex

Trailhead is Elk Creek, about an hour and half drive from Great Falls, through Augusta. Portion of route on gravel road. Approximate 1 mile out and back

The Chinese Wall

There are seven natural land features you can see from space; the Bob Marshall Wilderness' Chinese Wall is one of them. The Bob Marshall Wilderness complex is the largest wilderness area in the lower 48 and literally 40 miles as the crow flies from Great Falls. In 2011, when I couldn't fight forest fires as a hotshot anymore, I lived on a lookout 17 miles back in The Bob that overlooked the Chinese Wall.

There are seven upthrusts, and the Chinese Wall happens to be the most consistent one.

It's really a cliff band of 26 miles, maybe 33 miles long, and 1,000-foot cliffs. There are seven bands, and the band I was on looked back at the Continental Divide, which is the Chinese Wall.

I have a picture that I took of the Chinese Wall, which I had commissioned by an artist, and painted for me. I have this massive thing in my office now, which is pretty cool. It's an incredible feature. Depending on where you enter The Bob, it can be a day trip. Again, it's a 17-mile hike to get back to it, one way, and it's a wilderness

area, so you can't have anything mechanized, no bikes, no dirt bikes, no vehicles, but you can have horses.

Be brave enough to try something new. There are many bears deep in the Bob, so you need to be bear aware if you do go back there. Have your pepper spray, know what to do when you run into wildlife, take care of nature - pack in, pack out, watch the weather as it comes through. It's incredible to get out of the day-to-day routine, get away from cell phones, and really get perspective in life.

SNOW

SILVER CREST

A little history: Chuck and I came to Great Falls 47 years ago with our 4 young children. Of course, we had heard about Showdown for winter recreation. Then we heard there was this place called Silver Crest Trails in the Little Belt Mountains, a perfect place for us to recreate with the children.

We pulled the little ones in a pulk, which is a sled that doesn't have deep rudders. We were harnessed up like a reindeer pulling the kids and they loved it.

At the point we started going, Silver Crest didn't have the big, beautiful parking lot, there weren't the number of people skiing, and the number of snowmobiles up there was much lower. The Great Falls Cross Country Club (GFCCC) did the heavy work getting grants, grooming trails, and working with the Forest Service for non-motorized, mostly winter recreation.

Fast forward to 2010 when I was at a GFCCC meeting with about 20 other people. The Forest Service wanted to use the interior of the Silver Crest area for snowshoeing—a pretty unpopular idea with many of the club members. There were a few of us who thought it was important to get more people coming to Silver Crest to get out in the winter. At that point we formed the Silver Crest Trails Association and continued the volunteer grooming and maintenance of the trail system.

The addition of snowshoeing has been fantastic. There is respect between the cross-country skiers and the those who snowshoe. We now have four spots along the trail that are very well marked where snowshoers can cross, from one place to another, without problems. It has multiplied tremendously the number of people using the parking lot and enjoying winter at Silver Crest. Also, with the increased number of amenities - latrine, shelters along the trails, benches to sit on, billboards for announcements and instruction, we have seen a great increase in the numbers of outdoor enthusiasts from other areas of the state. They love the snow and the elevation of Silver Crest.

Our grandson's Eagle Scout project was producing wooden signs for the cross-country trails and routing them out with the names of all the different trails such as Silver Dyke, Sluice Box, 89er, etc. All trails are named after mining locations or other factors to do with mining, which was an important economic activity in the Monarch/Neihart area of Northcentral Montana.

The location of Silver Crest Trails is about 2 miles north of Showdown Ski area and 6.5 miles south of Neihart. Turnoff is marked by a sign that reads USFS Winter Recreation Area.

I recommend layering like an onion when you are looking to get out and recreate! The first step is easy: if you can walk, you can snowshoe. Get more insight about Silver Crest and what to use when layering like an onion on Episode 12 of the We're No Dam Experts podcast!



Western Art Capital of the World

Great Falls has been my home since 1961—I'll let you do the math on just how long I have been here. Western Art Week got its start way back in 1969 with the very first Russell Art Auction. It was one of the greatest experiences of my life, and one I have loved with all my heart since then!

Western Art Week was born out the need for the local Ad Club to come up with a new fundraiser after a change in administration at the state level deemed giving away a real Cadillac at our successful Cadillac Dinner fundraiser as a lottery. After losing our fundraiser, we needed to come up with a new idea.

I had attended my first auction for the treasures of dear Abby Welsh in the gymnasium of

Geraldine, Montana. I bought a cut glass candy dish, that I still use, for \$7.50. I thought to myself, this auction had all the elements of excitement, it was prosperous, and everybody had a good time... so, why not have an auction in Great Falls? I first pondered who the most famous person in Great Falls was. Obviously, Charlie Russell! Further, Great Falls was home to a great institution which such an auction could benefit, the C.M. Russell Museum (formerly called C.M. Russell Gallery).

We started planning in December of 1968 and, by March of 1969, the first Russell Art Auction was held. One important thing was needed to make the first auction go well—a good auctioneer. My late husband suggested I take a listen to Jack Raty, who did all the farm auctions in the area. He had never sold a piece of

art in his life, but he had sold a lot of cattle. We met in the Rainbow Hotel coffee shop where he sold me the sugar bowl from the center of the table with his wonderful chant. We hired him on the spot! The first catalogue was eight pages with seventy-six pieces of art. The auction was held in the Rainbow Hotel and drew people from all over Montana and beyond!

Today, Western Art Week includes educational symposiums, quick draws, essay contests, 16 shows (and growing), and the famed Russell Art Auction. People still travel from all over the nation to be in the Western Art Capital of the World for one week in March!

1

Weather is weather. It may shine, it may rain, it has no impact on the day. Get out and have fun.

2

Western Art is more than an oil painting of a cowboy from the 1800's. We have that, but there is so much more, like: jewelry, wood carvings, bronzes, native dance performances, furniture, gun powder art, antler carvings, live music, and soil art.

3

Give the art its space. Some art is meant to be handled (hello, Western Jewelry and Furniture!) and other art is meant to have some breathing room and distance from your red wine. If you aren't sure if you can touch a piece, just ask. The artist will appreciate it.

4

Talk with the artist. They want to tell you where they painted the piece, how it's different than their other work, or how it took them eight months to find the perfect piece of leather to complete the piece. If the show area gets busy and you aren't going to buy, free up the artist's time so they can meet with their other guests.

5

Have your art sent home. You might arrive by plane or a packed car and don't want to take the chance damaging the art in transit. You can ask an artist to ship the art and you can even ask for a different frame for the piece. It may cost a little more, but it will be customized to your taste and arrive safely.

6

Bring the kids—and a plan. Kids LOVE art, they have to. Isn't it the reason they color on our walls? Bring them to the art show and let them see and touch (if appropriate), all the mediums found in the shows. If they fit in one, bring a stroller to keep them in for when they shouldn't be too close to the art.

7

Respect the artist's talent and the price of their art. It takes artists years to perfect their craft. If the large original isn't in your budget, ask for a smaller Giclée print or a business card and start saving up to buy a piece later. They may even offer payment plans! See if you can make mutually beneficial arrangements to make the piece yours.

Aliens in Great Falls

What we are about to share with you is highly disputed, however, it's a story that is essential to understanding the name of our beloved baseball team.

It was a fall day in 1950 in Great Falls, Montana and the general manager of the minor-league baseball team, Nick, alongside his secretary, Virginia, were out at the stadium, when he saw it. A bright flash of light coming from overhead that prompted Nick to grab his 16 mm movie camera and film for :16 seconds capturing two rotating flying circle objects. Nick and Virginia


witnessed two jet fighters pass by shortly after the filming stopped.

Now, Nick couldn't believe that had happened, so he shared his story, with friends, family, community groups, and the media. The story quickly spread around the nation – Nick had seen UFOs! Soon, Nick and Virginia were being interviewed by military personnel at Malmstrom Air Force Base and the film Nick had taken was being analyzed.

The official determination of what Nick and Virginia saw – reflections from the F-94 jets. What happened next was more

studies, more analysis, and a few unanswered questions regarding 3 feet of film. This story today is referred to as the Mariana Incident, and many people believe that what Nick saw in the sky that fall day was a UFO. Since then, countless others have claimed to see unidentifiable flying objects in the area, making Great Falls, Montana the most active location in North America for UFO sightings.

Nick Mariana was the general manager of the minor league baseball team. They are now called the Great Falls Voyagers and their mascot, an alien named Orbit. The Voyagers are 4-time Pioneer League Champions and always in pursuit of their next title.

Tips for the Best Dam Trip

#1

Coordinate travel to include or avoid events. You may be a person that wants to be here for specific events, or you may want to know when specific events will be here so you can avoid crowds. What floats your boat is fine with us.

#2

Fly into Great Falls for your Yellowstone and Glacier National Park adventures. GTF has the lowest average fares in Montana and rental cars are reasonable.

#3

4th of July in Great Falls is pretty epic. You'll get a parade, free Hootenanny downtown, baseball, and fireworks over the Missouri River. If you love freedom, you'll love our town's celebration.

#4

Rodeos and PowWows don't occur every day and they aren't usually events that happen together. If you want to experience both during your trip, plan very strategically – it can be done, but it's usually a very specific date range.

#5

We have all the seasons, sometimes all in one day. Come visit Spring, Summer, Winter, or Fall – Great Falls is ready for you to recreate anytime.

#6

There are 4 falls in Great Falls. If you missed this back on page 18, we'll wait while you to go and refresh yourself. The falls are neat all year round, but in late May and June, they will take your breath away.

#7

Guided services need to be scheduled. Occasionally a guided fly fishing or Upper Missouri River Breaks trip can be coordinated when you get here, but we recommend getting that scheduled well in advance.

#8

Not everything you want to experience may be easy to get to. For example, you cannot drive up to the Chinese Wall. We know it's big, but you'll still have to hike into the Bob Marshall Wilderness to see it.

#9

You may need to acclimate before you recreate. If you're coming from a lower elevation, even if you fit as a fiddle, the higher elevation may take some wind out of your sails.



Capture Your Visit Like a Pro

There is no doubt that while you are visiting Great Falls, you will see some stunning views. Whether you're a professional photographer or someone getting familiar with their lens, we have the spots just for you, and some pointers too.



CAPTURE THE WILDLIFE, NOT THEIR ATTENTION

Our untouched wilderness makes it easier to see wildlife in the area. Make sure you have the right lens to capture the wildlife you see from a distance, and don't disrupt their mealtime, otherwise they may add you as their next course.



EXTREME TEMPS CAUSE EXTREME BEAUTY

Giant Springs State Park is a crystalized winter wonderland when the temps drop below zero. Waterfowl flock to the area since the Giant Springs remain a constant 54°F. Get the most out of your wardrobe and dress in layers to comfortably capture the scene.



FAST WATER LOOKS COOL WITH SLOW SPEEDS

Whether it's one of our falls during spring runoff, or Belt Creek, use long exposure to have a blurred water effect with a crisp landscape. You'll need your tripod, and a plan before you go. Spring Runoff is beautiful, but it can be dangerous if you choose to enter the water. Always know your limits.



CAPTURE OUR BIG SKY WITH SMALL APERTURES

Stunning landscapes beg to be photographed crisply. Use a small aperture to have more of the landscape in focus, and, depending on the time of day, you may need to use a tripod to accommodate the slower shutter speeds that small apertures require.



BLACK EAGLE FALLS AND BEYOND

While some of our favorite photos shared by visitors are those of Black Eagle Falls, take a hike to get deeper into the area and see scenes to which few venture. Make sure you're prepared for your hike and bring plenty of water, snacks, bug and bear spray. Just remember, if you pack it in, pack it out.


